His unit was needed to defend against the potential threat of Soviet expansion during the Berlin Wall crisis. My aunt remembers “he left the next day”. This is an example of the sacrifices veterans make for their country. My grandpa did not know how long he would be gone (a year), or what sorts of danger he would encounter, but it was his duty to leave behind his family and respond to orders. He probably didn’t want to leave, but he had an obligation to serve his country. For that, I thank all veterans who put their country in front of everything else, including their families.
